







## Inter-regional SDG Localization Workshop

Impact and Systemic Change through SDG Localization



NOVEMBER 10-12, 2025 MARRIOTT HOTEL AMMAN, JORDAN

#### Background

The world faces interlinked crises that threaten the 2030 Agenda — from rising inequalities and climate emergencies to a \$4 trillion annual financing gap. One in twelve people still experiences hunger, while billions lack access to safe drinking water, sanitation, and hygiene. Inequalities persist, with the total slum population being over 1.12 billion people. Additionally, 318 million experience absolute homelessness. With only 18 per cent of SDGs on track, localization has become the decisive lever to drive systemic change through place-based, inclusive, and multilevel action.

**Localizing the SDGs** is a dynamic, two-way process that aligns national and local priorities, enables data-driven planning and investment, and empowers local actors to deliver impact. It demands coherence across governance levels, integrated policy frameworks, and robust mechanisms to translate global ambition into tangible local outcomes.

**Localization is the opportunity** for governments, stakeholders, development partners and the United Nations system to collectively move beyond ad hoc project approaches toward multistakeholder inclusive processes aimed at promoting systemic change at the local level – delivering long lasting impact where it matters the most.

To this end, **UN-Habitat's Strategic Plan 2026–2029** identifies SDG localization and participatory multilevel governance as a means of implementation to achieve adequate housing, access to land and basic services for all.

Co-chaired by UN-Habitat, the **Local2030 Coalition** is the UN system-wide platform to accelerate the localization of the 2030 Agenda enhancing coherence, efficiency and impact of UN action, while engaging national and local governments, civil society and academia, the private sector, and youth to collectively advance SDG implementation. It does so by mainstreaming localization through four workstreams – Advocacy; Capacity building; Scale-up Action; and Monitoring, and by mainstreaming the use of tools such as the Bilbao Blueprint and the SDG Localization Marker 2.0.

Further complementing the UN-system and global efforts, the Italian Ministry of Environment and Energy Security (MASE) and UN-Habitat jointly launched the Partnership Platform on Localizing the SDGs. By engaging with the central and subnational governments, the Platform helps formulating policies, collecting and sharing knowledge while strengthening capacities at all levels to plan, measure and deliver impacts. Through the design and implementation of National SDG Localization Frameworks, the Platform supports countries in establishing the enabling conditions for sustainable development — fostering policy coherence, empowering local actors, and mobilizing investments for catalytic projects that align environmental, and development objectives. Launched only recently, the Partnership Platform has engaged in continuous outreach and networking to better profiling its role and operational contribution to SDGs localization. In this spirit, discussions and results of this workshop will be reported also in the context of the Partnership Platform, contributing to its vision.



#### **Background** •

The National SDG Localization Frameworks are meant to be effective and country-specific tool for multilevel governance and policy coherence for sustainable development implementation, aiming at enabling systemic change at the local level. In line with the National Frameworks promoted through the Partnership Platform, UN-Habitat supports cities in simplifying complex local development processes and accelerating their path toward prosperity though the **SDG Cities initiative** – UN-Habitat's corporate approach to city development through the SDGs.

The **Arab States region** is placing capacity building at the center of SDG Localization through pioneer initiatives like the Arab Mayors Academy, led by UNESCWA and UN-Habitat. This initiative brings together governors, mayors, deputy governors, and senior local leaders from across the Arab region to enhance their ability to tackle urban development challenges.

UN-Habitat also collaborates with **academia and the sports community** to unlock the potential of SDG localization through **multi-stakeholder engagement**. As part of this effort, the agency supports the Local2030 Knowledge and Scientific Network and has collaborated with the International Olympic Committee to launch the Sports for Sustainable Urban Development initiative. This program integrates sport, physical activity, and active recreation into SDG localization processes, generating tangible urban impact and acting as a catalyst for the 2030 Agenda.

In this context, Jordan has emerged as a hub of innovation, unifying and advancing multiple initiatives such as the Local2030 Knowledge and Scientific Network in Irbid and Aqaba and the Pathways to Inclusive Development project, among others. Notably, the country has also established local Urban Observatories in several cities, including Irbid and Mafraq, through the **Urban Monitoring Framework (UMF)**, linking local indicators to the SDGs while upholding human rights and the principle of leaving no one and no place behind. The office continues to support multiple local partners by integrating multilevel governance, data systems, and community engagement, following UN-Habitat's approach to building data-driven, inclusive, and participatory urban governance systems.

This workshop falls under the **2030 Agenda Sub-fund Project** on SDG Localization co implemented by the United Nations Human Settlements Programme (UN-Habitat), United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (UNESCWA), United Nations Economic Commission for Africa (UNECA), United Nations Economic and Social Commission for Asia Pacific (UNESCAP), United Nations Department for Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA) and United Cities and Local Governments (UCLG).



# Objectives of the workshop

- Strengthen capacities of national and local actors to localize the SDGs through integrated data, planning, and financing approaches for systemic change.
- Facilitate a multilevel and multi-stakeholder dialogue focusing on solutions and impact-oriented innovation contributing to the delivery of the SDGs.
- Discuss the relevance and practices of multilevel governance as a contribution to the modelling of the National SDG Localization Frameworks, anchored to the process promoted by the Partnership Platform on Localizing the SDGs.
- Build local and regional capacities through training and peer learning, including through the Enhanced VLR Tool and Arab Mayors Academy, contributing to the Local2030 Coalition's Task Force on capacity building.
- Discuss and advance Jordan's leadership in SDG localization, inspiring related processes in other countries and with other partners in the region.
- Illustrate how research and sport can be a leverage for sustainable development and catalyse multistakeholder coordination and transformation at the local level.
- Contribute to a shared understanding of systemic change as the overarching outcome of integrated local action.

#### **Expected participants**

The workshop is designed to target technical representatives from local and regional governments, both with experience in SDG localization or new to the process. Experts and practitioners from national governments and agencies are also encouraged to contribute and engage. In addition, international networks, academia, PhD students, and civil society organizations will be invited to reflect the on how to collectively advance salutation for integrated local development, multilevel and multi-stakeholder approaches to SDG localization. The organization of the workshop will ensure both geographical and gender balance.
